## Quality Improvement Partnership

### *Baytown Habitat for Humanity*

Kareem and Tenisha Williams used to live apart for years because they couldn’t afford an apartment big enough for their family. Tenisha was living with family, but there was little room for her and her children to thrive while Kareem slept in a small apartment. The Williams’ were selected to become homeowners, and moved into their new home earlier this year. “Mentally, we are better, as we have space to get into a routine and do things together as a family. We can now do fast food Fridays, game nights, weekend barbecues and the kids can ride their bicycles and scooters on the front driveway. *Baytown Habitat for Humanity made the house affordable, for couple like us, who would not have otherwise afforded a house on the market.*”
